From the Desk of Chief Scientific Investment Officer, Ken Kilgore, PhD

Adjusted for inflation, the NIH budget is almost 20% less than it was 18 years ago. Celiac disease is the least funded GI-related disease, despite the prevalence and mortality rate. The decline in federal funding for biomedical research has led to fewer grant applications being funded, and we are losing the opportunity to cultivate new researchers who may not see a career in biomedical research. We can't let the fate of celiac disease research lie in the hands of inconsistent and inadequate funding from public sources. If we want a cure, we need a transformational approach.

Traditional ways of investing in research have rarely included community-based nonprofits. Beyond Celiac is changing that model. We are creating an avenue by which donors can support research beyond the narrow confines of one specific research institution. As the Chief Scientific Investment Officer of Beyond Celiac, I will lead the work of assessing the opportunities and risks for philanthropists who want to accelerate research for celiac disease and will create an avenue by which they can put their resources to work on the most promising solutions. If this grabs your attention, we need to talk! We can work together for a cure.

2019 BEYOND CELIAC RESEARCH SYMPOSIUM

Patients are used to hearing that the first drug to treat celiac disease is likely to be approved in about five years. But at the 3rd Annual Beyond Celiac Research Symposium on May 30, 2019, Beyond Celiac shared a behind-the-scenes look at what it is really going to take to get new treatments to the market. The Symposium was free and open to the public and live streamed around the world for those who couldn't make it in person.

Moderated by Marie Robert, MD, celiac disease and drug development experts on the symposium panel had a wide-ranging discussion before an international live and webcast audience detailing the many steps taken before, during and after a new treatment enters even the earliest phase of clinical trial. Emphasis was given to the importance of the patient voice throughout the drug development process.

Panelists Sonia Kupfer, MD, a gastroenterologist at the University of Chicago Celiac Disease Center, Joseph Murray, MD, a celiac disease expert and professor of medicine at the Mayo Clinic, and Linda Deal, MS, head of patient centered outcomes assessment at the pharmaceutical company Pfizer, also explored non-celiac gluten sensitivity and symptoms, the celiac disease diagnosis rate, the risks of minor gluten exposure and follow-up health care.

Several panel discussions were webcast about the challenges that our community faces in managing celiac disease, experiences that community members have had in participating in clinical trials, and barriers to research.

The 2019 summit built on the results of our innovative 2015 summit, which was widely hailed as highly impactful and led to new scientific collaborations and honing the steps to advance patient-centered celiac disease research.

The 2019 summit took place against the backdrop of at least 12 clinical trials for celiac disease treatments. The aim of Beyond Celiac was to comprehensively address elements that must be in place to get a drug to market, including the remaining barriers in this decades-long journey to help patients with celiac disease. GO BEYOND CELIAC EXPANSION

In August 2019, Beyond Celiac launched a first-of-its-kind mobile app to complement its online research database, *Go Beyond Celiac*, providing more convenience and opportunity for patient engagement.



Go Beyond Celiac, which has enrolled more than 5,800 participants since its launch in 2017, is an online database created by people with celiac disease, for people with celiac disease. Users can

participate in research by sharing their stories and experiences and learn how to become involved in celiac disease research studies. The new app now makes Go Beyond Celiac more interactive and engaging, and the mobile convenience encourages more people to visit and share their experience of living with and managing celiac disease. This is done through surveys that can be filled out at users' convenience. The app also offers helpful insights about events, educational opportunities and more. Go Beyond Celiac members will be able to see how they compare to others as a more complete picture of celiac disease emerges from the data collected.

Survey of Patient Receptivity to Participating in Research Accepted for presentation at national conference


People who have celiac disease are willing to participate in celiac disease research, but less so if a study involves eating gluten or getting a biopsy, a 2019 survey by Beyond Celiac has found.

The survey of about 4,500 adults with celiac disease was done in advance of the recent Beyond Celiac Research Summit and results were shared there. Nearly 500 parents of children with celiac disease also completed a separate survey.




Only about 9 percent of both adults and parents said they would not participate or allow participation in any kind of celiac disease research.

Brain Fog Study Presented at the International Celiac Disease Symposium



Brain Fog Research highlighted by Jessica Edwards George, PhD and Alice Bast at the 2019 International Celiac Disease Symposium in Paris A step toward better understanding of brain fog and other neurocognitive symptoms in celiac disease and how they affect day-to-day life is described in research Beyond Celiac presented at the 2019 International Celiac Disease Symposium in Paris. The study details the analysis of nearly 500 openended survey responses in which those who have celiac disease and nonceliac gluten sensitivity (NCGS) described neurocognitive symptoms after gluten exposure.

The responses were part of a larger survey of nearly 1,400 patients who identified difficulty concentrating, forgetfulness and grogginess, often one to four hours after being exposed to gluten.

The portion of the survey in which patients described symptoms in their own way is the basis of the new analysis. Cognitive, psychological and quality of life symptoms were most commonly mentioned and emerged as themes.


2019 GO BEYOND CELIAC GALA AND CONCERT

DESCRIPTION OF WORK ······

The study addresses the dilemma of weighing the potential health problems related to undiagnosed celiac disease in asymptomatic children with the potential burden of the gluten-free diet, which can be socially limiting and lead to problems with anxiety, depression and a general reduction in quality of life, plus some nutritional concerns.

Research focuses on T-cells in the inner gut lining – killer CD8 T-cells. The role of another type of T-cell, the CD4 T-cell, has been more thoroughly studied and scientists know it responds to gluten and plays a key role in celiac disease. Less is known about CD8 T-cells though they lead to the myriad of consequences of celiac disease.







While it's important to appreciate our accomplishments of 2019, Beyond Celiac is, as always, looking to the future.

RESPONSE TO COVID-19

When the novel coronavirus came to the United States, we received countless inquiries about how COVID-19 might impact people with celiac disease. The science and communications teams quickly built out an extensive page filled with resources to answer the most common questions and provide additional support to our community. Throughout the crisis we shared videos of our science team leaders answering questions about celiac disease and coronavirus. This page proved to be immensely popular and useful to our community and was cited on other websites, such as the National Health Council, as a source for reputable information.





In addition, to keep the spirits of our community up during periods of isolation, we started the virtual Beyond Celiac Book Club that highlighted relevant books and allowed for intriguing conversation and engagement over social media. We also created new recipes and recipe videos, including making your own gluten-free sourdough starter and baked goods—a popular project during quarantine. Our virtual running/walking club also gained steam during this period.

ORIGINAL BEYOND CELIAC RESEARCH

Beyond Celiac is sharing research insights learned from *Go Beyond Celiac*. This monthly update engages participants in the database and the wider research and patient communities in better understanding the journey and challenges before, during and after diagnosis.

Additionally, the Beyond Celiac science team swiftly created a COVID-19 and Celiac Disease survey as part of the *Go Beyond Celiac* database. More than 300 community members recorded both the physical and psychological impact of the global coronavirus pandemic on the celiac disease community.





VIRTUAL STEP BEYOND CELIAC 5K

At the start of 2020, Beyond Celiac announced the expansion of our Step Beyond Celiac 5K events to five cities across the United States. With the uncertainty of the COVID-19 crisis, we have built and expanded a companion Virtual Step Beyond Celiac 5K five-city tour. Additionally, we focused on using Step Beyond Celiac social pages to engage with our community and keep them informed with the latest on our races, promoting our Strava Run Club, and ways to stay healthy and active during quarantine.

SUMMER INTERN COUNCIL

Newly created starting this summer, Beyond Celiac has launched its Summer Intern Council. College student interns will work both independently and collaboratively on projects designed to drive the organization forward. Funded through the generosity of celiac disease community member Mary Bianco, the Summer Intern Council will support efforts to raise awareness, drive diagnosis and support research for treatments and a cure, and also provide the Beyond Celiac staff with a fresh perspective on the organization's programs and services.
